<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Operator must be deemed competent. 2. Operator must be familiar with the operator’s manual and machine safety labels. 3. Conduct pre-op inspection.(guards, shields, hydraulics, wear & tear) 4. Follow proper fueling procedures. 5. PPE must be worn at all times. 6. Keep away from moving parts. (engine, chains and sprockets). 7. Always operate from the driver’s seat position. (right or left) 8. Check for pedestrians and bystanders. 9. Shoulder check when backing up. Check mirrors. 10. Never brush towards people or buildings. 11. Operate at a slow speed when on a slope. 12. Ensure the sweeper is on firm, level ground before raising hopper. 13. Parking brake must be on before raising or tilting the hopper. 14. Lower hopper to the transport position before moving. 15. Do not raise hopper under trees, bridges or electrical wires. 16. Post operation, park on firm, level ground, set park brake, lower hopper & remove key. 17. Check for signs of excessive wear or damage. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Repair or replace damaged parts. 18. REPORT ANY DANGEROUS SITUATIONS TO THE SUPERVISOR
